Greetings Virginia 4-H All Stars!

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Finally, one of the more controversial words in any person's vocabulary: change. They wither and blow away as they become irrelevant to the newer generations. 4-H All Stars are poised in a wonderful place to help shape the future of 4-H by finding ways to change some of our traditions without losing the integrity of our mission. We have the ability and indeed duty to clean out the stacks of useless papers and cobwebs so that we can air out and show off all that is wonderful about our organization. An old Hebrew proverb says that "a man who bends too far will break." I can't argue that this is true; if bent too far, anyone would break. Consider the image of a dancer though. A dancer spends hours training and stretching in order to help the body bend in the right places and to its' fullest ability. That is the sort of change I think we should be embracing. All Stars has an incredibly important place in the history, present, and future of 4-H but we must learn to stretch ourselves – just as the youth stretch themselves, in order to reach our full potential.

With these three words in mind – passion, tradition, and change – I challenge each and every one of you to find a way to combine these three words into your work with Virginia 4-H All Stars this year. Look for the passion in our organization and deepen it. Find the traditions which matter most and reaffirm their history and importance. Let go of what is no longer relevant so that refreshing, promising, and limitless changes may be welcomed and new traditions born. My hope is that together, we will build a stronger and more youthful organization which will continue to carry out our motto of service through passion filled traditions and the sort of close-knit friendships for which 4-H All Stars are known.

Last, but certainly not least, I've got some business items to share! I would like to thank all those who have given of their time, talents, and treasures over this last year. 4-H All Stars is truly a service oriented group and I know we have many, many un-sung heroes among us. Your enthusiasm and giving hearts have not gone unnoticed. Thank you! Welcome to the 2015 tapped All Stars! You all are the next generation of All Stars and we welcome you to join in on serving your local 4-H programs and participating as volunteers in every level of Virginia 4-H. Finally, I'd like to personally invite all Virginia 4-H All Stars to join us for our very exciting annual Midwinter's Conference: "By Land, Air, or Sea Experience Hampton's History!" to be held in Hampton Roads Virginia, February 6 & 7 2016! Look for details and registration information inside this edition of the Virginia Star!



In Honor and Memory of Our Fellow All Stars:



Kenneth Edward Dawson, 88, died on September 10, 2015, born in Newark, Ohio, on May 3, 1927, Ken grew up in Pittsylvania County, Va. He graduated from Spring Garden High School in Chatham, Va., in 1945. After serving in the Army from 1946 to 1948, he enrolled in V.P.I., graduating in 1952. He taught at Wytheville High School and Jefferson Senior High School in Roanoke, and returned to Virginia Tech in 1956 as Assistant Professor. Ken received a Master of Education degree from the University of Virginia and a PhD from the University of Maryland. Having traveled to 60 countries and all of the United States, Dr. Dawson helped develop liaison relationships between Virginia Tech and many nations including China, Japan, Brazil, Haiti, Yugoslavia, Portugal and Egypt. Kenneth attended Rock Eagle Georgia Volunteer Leaders National Conference for many

years. Helped developed the International 4-H Youth Exchange (IFYE) foreign exchange program in Virginia. Served as the Founding President of Southside Virginia Community College: 1969-1973, Tapped into All-Stars 1974, Director of the Virginia 4-H Program: 1973-1983, VT Professor of International Development and Director of Training: 1983-1992 (retired in 1992), Member of the Montgomery County 4-H Administrative Board: mid 1980's- 2002 Kenneth Dawson shared his faith in Jesus Christ through his kindness and generosity by teaching Sunday school for over 50 years, and serving as an active deacon. At death, he was a member of Belmont Christian Church. Ken was very active in civic organizations. He was longtime chaplain of the local A.A.R.P. and served as President of several Rotary Clubs. To those left behind, Ken Dawson says, "Love one another deeply, serve the Lord with gladness, and thank Him for every blessing. Life is good!"

His positive influence in the lives of countless youth and adults in the Virginia 4-H program is evidenced by the productive and contributing citizens that they have become today.

EMANCIPATOPN OAK (Located at Hampton University)

The Emancipation Oak stands near the entrance of the Hampton University campus and is a lasting symbol of the university's rich heritage and perseverance. During the Civil War, Union General Benjamin F. Butler's "contraband of war" decision at Fort Monroe in 1861 changed the fates of many African-American slaves, enabling hundreds to reach freedom behind Union lines. Although previously forbidden an education by Virginia law, the rising number of "contrabands" camped in the area prompted the establishment of schools for those freedmen who exhibited "a great thirst for knowledge".

The peaceful shade of the young oak served as the first classroom for newly freed men and women, eager for an education. Mrs. Mary Peake, daughter of a freed colored woman and a Frenchman, conducted the first lessons taught under the oak located on the University's campus. Classes continued with the The Butler School, which was constructed in 1863 next to the oak. One day in 1863, the members of the Virginia Peninsula's black community gathered to hear a prayer answered. The Emancipation Oak was the site of the first Southern reading of President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, an act which accelerated the demand for African-American education. With limbs sprawling over a hundred feet in diameter, the Emancipation oak is designated as one of the 10 Great Trees of the World by the National Geographic Society.

Air Power Park

The park features an indoor museum that is currently open seven days a week from 8:30 am-4:30 pm. The indoor museum features rooms dedicated to the Military Branches of service, a collection of Balsa wood models donated by a local gentleman, and a NASA exhibit that tells all about space exploration.

St. Johns Church

St. John's Episcopal Church was established in 1610 is the oldest English-speaking parish in continuous existence in the United States of America. English settlers from Jamestown established a community and church on the tip of the Virginia Peninsula on July 9, 1610, one month after Lord De La Warr arrived at Jamestown with supplies that effectively ended the Starving Time in that settlement. This new settlement was named after the Algonquian-speaking Kecoughtan who lived in the area
