2020 4-H Club of the Year: Hoof N Woof 4-H Club, Albemarle – For the 2019-2020 year Hoof N Woof had 27 members that participated in no less than 38 4-H events from the local to National level. Meeting regularly throughout the year, this club, like many others, had to work through all the challenges that Covid presented. Meetings continued to involve field trips and guest speakers through Zoom. And when the time came for awards, senior officers were creative delivering packets, balloons, and a goody bags to each member's house. The club enjoyed social distanced meetings, including the virtual State Show awards, and other events such as a gymkhana, a drill team, a horse show, and a horse judging contest. The club's structure holds opportunities for 10 officer positions and 5 committee chair positions and is supported by 3 adult leaders, Bertha Durbin, Katie Sears, and Laura Butler. Community service involved road clean-up projects, fundraising for Hope's Legacy, the Angel Tree drive, and the Toy Lift projects. Fundraisers include organizing an annual horse show, redeeming feed tag labels through Southern States and Triple Crown feeds, and having an annual

tack sale, all of which support members competing in and traveling to the 4-H knowledge competitions. Hoof N Woof recognizes all of their adult parent volunteers as the invaluable backbone to the club which also includes those who no longer have children in the Club. These volunteers work at the state contests, assist in mounted events, chaperone at knowledge competitions, and serve on the board. The club says they are able to do so much because of the special talents and devoted time from their leaders, volunteers, and members. Like many clubs, Hoof N Woof serves a diverse membership whether they have a horse or not — all one needs is a love, interest, and curiosity in horses! They consider their club family and enjoy time with one another, they laugh a lot, have fun, and care for and support one another in good times and in bad times. It is not uncommon to see high-fives, hugs, hand-shakes, and smiles. The atmosphere is such that the kids do not want to go home and parents enjoy the social time. Of course, this looks a bit different with masks and social distancing. However, even though they may be physically further apart than ever before, 4-H has been a bright spot for so many members, and friendships are closer than ever. Hoof N Woof's application was unique in that they gave great focus to the 4-H Clover's Head, Heart, Hand, and Health. Below, we share with you an excerpt from their submission:
